The program gives reservists a chance to *continue to use their skills* and knowledge to serve their community. Currently, most reservists are **retired RCMP regular members**. However, some divisions also accept applicants from other Canadian police agencies.

The Man was APPOINTED to take My complaint, so he very much falls under the jurisdiction of this investigation, and it happened on Your property, so You are a corporate body are liable if not Your personal agents, You accept liability as principal to agent.

You are on NOTICE OF CIVIL AND CRIMINAL LIABILITY, AGGRAVATED HARM.
